The Idaho Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program provides technical and financial assistance to landowners interested in restoring and enhancing wildlife habitat on their land.

Projects are custom-designed to meet landowners' needs.



WHO CAN PARTICPATE?

- Privately-owned land (not owned by the State or Federal Government)
- Why Private Land?
 - 32% of Idaho Panhandle in private ownership
 - Wildlife do not understand jurisdictional boundaries
 - Minimal dedicated funds for private lands conservation.



Conservation in rural communities promotes sustainable working landscapes which benefits prospering local economies and wildlife.

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

- The landowner works with the Fish and Wildlife Service's Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program biologist and a local cooperator to design, fund and implement a project.
- A **local cooperator** is a non-federal agency, business, non-profit organization or tribe that receives and manages the funding, handles all contracting and invoicing.

THE LANDOWNER'S ROLE

- Sign a landowner agreement to maintain habitat for at least 10 years.
- Allow access, with advance notification, for project implementation and monitoring.

FUNDING


- Up to \$25,000 per project from USFWS.
- A 50:50 cost-share is targeted, but flexible. Can be "in-kind" or cash.
- Can cost-share with anyone: landowners, federal/state/local agencies, conservation districts, NGOs, businesses, tribes, etc.

Idaho PFW Program

Our priority is to work in focus areas and promote habitat restoration projects that benefit federal trust species (migratory birds, T & E and at-risk species).

2015-2019 Accomplishments:

- 130 habitat projects
- 15,902 acres of upland
- 2,141 acres of wetland
- 28.4 miles of stream & riparian
- 12 fish passage barriers



Selkirk Cabinet-Yaak

- Prioritize stream, wetland and riparian restoration for focal species
- Connect to other projects to achieve landscape-scale results
- Restore migration habitat









Bismark Meadows

- Landowner: Vital Ground, NRCS WRE
- Purpose: Restore wet meadow using beaver mimicry. Support sensitive plants by raising the water table.
- · Project expansion including outreach.







Kootenai Tributary

- Landowner: Private
- Purpose: Reconnect the floodplain and aggrade the highly incised channels using a mixture of BDAs and postassisted log structures (PALS).







Grouse Creek

- Landowners: Private
- Purpose: Restore in-stream and riparian habitat while stabilizing the eroding streambank.







Pack River


- Landowner: Bonner County
- Purpose: Restore native riparian and wetland vegetation through plantings and suppressing reed canarygrass.






Kootenai River

- Landowner: Private
- Purpose: Convert portions of cropland to stopover habitat for big game and other wildlife.


